A SAINT FROM GROVE PARK?? Henry Edward Dormer was born November 29, 1844 at Grove Park, County Warwick, England, the youngest son of the eleventh Lord Dormer. Little is known of his early life, except that he was a sensitive child who was quite delicate in health. His early studies and first communion were made at St. Mary's College, Oscott (*now the diocesan seminary but then a boarding school*), but at the age of twelve he contracted rheumatic fever and for five years was tutored privately in England, Belgium, Germany and Ireland. At the age of 19, young Dormer returned to Oscott where he completed his studies for entrance into the army. It was here that he made a retreat under Father Rudolph Suffield, a Dominican friar, which apparently changed his whole outlook on life. After passing his exams, Dormer was gazetted to a commission in the 60th Regiment (King's Own Royal Rifles). In January 1866, he was ordered to join his regiment at London, Canada, stationed here at that time to counteract Fenian plans to invade Canada. He arrived in London on February 22, 1866, and his first impressions of the city, as described in a letter to his mother, were none too flattering: *"It has positively no resources of its own, no shooting, no fishing, no skating, and a very indifferent society, no libraries, no clubs and no walks except a high road up to your knees in mud"*. -By September of that year, it was evident to his brother officers and the Catholics of London that Dormer was leading a life of selfless devotion to God. His prayer life often included whole nights of prayer and he attended regularly to the needs of the poor, the sick, and the elderly. In addition to his time and effort, he bestowed money, his own clothes, food and other necessities to those in want. He also gave religious instruction to children and to soldiers, if they requested it. All this time, Dormer wrestled in his own life with the question of a religious vocation. At the end of September 1866, while nursing a woman ill with typhoid fever, Dormer caught the disease and died on October 2nd. He was only twenty-one years of age and had just decided to enter the Dominican novitiate. Word of his death spread quickly and, according to contemporary newspaper accounts, the most common exclamation of the people was "The saint is dead!" His funeral was one of the largest recorded in the city, and he was buried with military honours in St. Peter's Cemetery.

CHILDREN'S LITURGY Help is needed with the Children's Liturgy. The leader does not have to be a qualified teacher or catechist, although that is a bonus, but someone comfortable in her or his faith and eager to support the children as they grow in the Faith. There is a booklet to guide each session. But the best way to find out is to sit in and watch. Sometimes there is simply need for an adult to sit in, if there is only one leader. Perhaps it is important to point out that the Children's Liturgy is not a crèche but a real liturgy of the Word, paralleling the one that goes on in the church but a level suited to young children.

VOCATIONS TO THE PERMANENT DIACONATE The understanding of the potential for the permanent diaconate in the mission of the Church is developing. To increase diocesan resources for the Church's mission, we are looking especially for deacons who in addition to their parish work can give leadership in bringing the gospel to the world in chaplaincy, in the workplace, and through many other ministries. It is appropriate that there should be a substantial period for discernment and preparation prior to a man being invited by the Archdiocese to make formal application. There is a leaflet at the back of church summarizing the main features of this ministry and giving information about the procedure for prospective candidates, who feel that they have a calling. Your prayers are asked for this ministry.

HOME - THE ART OF DYING WELL See www.artofdyingwell.org A new website offering a helping hand to those grappling with issues surrounding death and dying. Based on Catholic tradition but open to all, it features real-life stories about dealing with the journey through death to eternal life. "..... *mindful of the struggle that so many people (including Mass-going Catholics) have in speaking about death, this is something that people can be directed to for use in their own time. Dying well means different things to us all. Death is an individual experience, but a community of accompaniment on the journey can help us to prepare by bringing consolation and spiritual peace*".

SAME SEX MARRIAGE??? A proposed amendment to 'Relationships Education' – a new compulsory subject to be taught in all state-funded schools would require that pupils "*learn the importance of respect, tolerance and commitment in all types of healthy relationships*". This loosely-worded amendment could open the way to forcing schools to support same-sex relationships. Perhaps people may wish to write to their MP to point this out. See Coalition for Marriage admin@c4m.org.uk Ofsted inspectors applying the British values test in schools have already shown hostility towards traditional marriage supporters. In some cases, failure to support same-sex marriage has been used as the litmus test for deciding if a school is promoting extremism. See c4m.org.uk

TRINITY SCHOOL The sixth Form has been reprieved. But the wide-spread concern at the prospect of no post-16 Catholic education in the area has reminded people of the importance of the Catholic education system. But to make it work financially it needs the support of the Catholic families. Please make sure that people are aware of the existence of our Catholic schools. www.trinity-school.org.uk

ST MARY IMMACULATE PRIMARY SCHOOL The last Diocesan Inspection team (religious OFSTED) commented upon outstanding teaching, learning, monitoring and leadership. The pupils were described as "confident and secure" and "eager and attentive". They noted too that staff were "enthusiastic and dedicated", demonstrating "unswerving commitment". Older pupils were described as "dedicated at looking after their younger peers" and this coupled with "high expectations" and "opportunity for every pupil" means that the school continues to go from strength to strength.

FRIDAY ABSTINENCE *Because each Friday recalls the crucifixion of Our Lord, it is set aside as a special penitential day. Abstinence always meant the giving up of meat rather than the eating of fish as a substitute. The Bishops wish to re-establish the practice of Friday penance in the lives of the faithful as a clear and distinctive mark of their own Catholic identity. They recognize that the best habits are those which are acquired as part of a common resolve and common witness. It is important that all the faithful be united in a common celebration of Friday penance. Respectful of this and in accordance with the mind of the whole Church, the Bishops' Conference wishes to remind all Catholics in England and Wales of the obligation of Friday Penance. The Bishops have decided to re-establish the practice that this should be fulfilled by abstaining from meat.* (Conference of the Bishops of England and Wales 2011).

POPE FRANCIS' ADVICE FOR FAMILIES *"The love of friendship unifies all aspects of marital life and helps family members to grow constantly. This love must be freely and generously expressed in words and acts. In the family three words need to be used. I want to repeat this! Three words: 'Please', 'Thank you' and 'Sorry' – three essential words! When we are not selfish and can say: 'Thank you'; when someone realizes that he or she did something wrong and is able to say 'Sorry', our families experience peace and joy. Let us not be stingy about using these words but keep repeating them day after day" (Amoris Laetitia n. 133)*

REFUGEES AND MIGRANTS PRAYER

Merciful Father, God of all nations, we come before you as the people you have chosen as your own. You led your people from slavery to freedom and accompanied them throughout the traumatic journey. Your Son, Jesus, was born far from his family's home and they sought safety in another place soon after his birth. Hear our pleas for the people who have left their homeland amid tragedy, war and circumstances not of their making. You know each one by name and the secrets of their hearts, the pride in their heritage, the richness of their story. We ask your blessing on those who show hospitality to migrants and refugees on our behalf. Open our hearts that we never suffer indifference. May our prayers and words be accompanied by deeds that make a difference. Change the hearts of those who make dangerous journeys necessary, and those who exploit the desperate. As we cherish life, so may we be Christlike in our efforts to welcome the stranger, to love our neighbour, so that when we reach our longed for homeland, we may find in you then the welcome that we have offered others now. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

ELECTRICITY Thanks to a new alliance between IFM and Churchmarketplace, over 3200 parishes in 16 dioceses in England and Wales (including St Charles) are now buying 'green' electricity together from renewable sources, doing their bit to look after our common home, in harmony with the Pope's call to care for the environment (Laudato Si). At the same time we are getting competitive prices.

NUCLEAR WEAPONS A statement from the Catholic Bishops' Conference: *"We recognise the grave responsibility for national security that rests with our government and our parliament. We know that those charged with making the decision on whether to renew the UK's nuclear weapons programme will reflect seriously on whether their possession acts as an effective deterrent. We ask them to reflect too on the view that the use of nuclear weapons can never be morally justified as their use would cause the mass deaths of innocent civilians and does not fit within the Just War tradition. Such use could never be a proportionate response" and "Parliament now has an opportunity to reinforce the extension and implementation of the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty to which the UK is a signatory, and which obliges all who possess nuclear weapons to work towards their elimination. We pray that the decision taken by Parliament will include the intention and the steps to achieve that undertaking: the complete elimination of these weapons".* When Pope Francis addressed the United Nations, he concluded: *"An ethics and a law based on the threat of mutual destruction – and possibly the destruction of all mankind – are self-contradictory... There is urgent need to work for a world free of nuclear weapons, in full application of the non-proliferation Treaty, in light and spirit, with the goal of a complete prohibition of these weapons."*

INDULGENCES What are they? When we sin, there are two effects. Firstly, we offend God and secondly we inflict damage on ourselves in some way. In Confession we obtain God's forgiveness but the consequences of sin remain. That is what is meant when we speak of the temporal punishment due to sin. If we do not "pay this penalty", by extra good works and prayers in this life, Purgatory will do the rest. Indulgences are a way of wiping out these consequences. A plenary indulgence frees one from **all** temporal punishment due to sin. This gift can also be gained for other people, living or dead.

INDULGENCES - THE CHURCH'S SPIRITUAL TREASURY. Indulgences will be a big part of this Year of Jubilee and so it will be well to rehearse the teaching of the Church on this matter. Since the Church is the Body of Christ with each of us its members, whatever one does affects the others. So every good action, especially those of the saints, builds up a sort of spiritual treasury into which we are privileged to dip. The Church specifies the means of access. In the early centuries the penitential system was mainly concerned with serious sins (murder, apostasy, adultery etc.) and the penances were rather severe and could have included things that could take time, such as a pilgrimage. This would have taken x number of days. So when prayers began to be substituted for such penances, the idea arose that they would be the equivalent of the number of days the pilgrimage, for example, would have taken. That is why the old prayer books used to indicate the number of days that the indulgence was worth.

JOHN PAUL II AWARD This award is specifically for young people who have completed their GCSE's and who are ready to commit time to help in the Parish. This could involve reading at Mass, cleaning, helping at the children's liturgy etc. etc. They would also record hours of service in some sort of social action, which could be anything from being a volunteer coach for a sports team, fund-raising or even being a handmaid (or the male equivalent) at Lourdes. This award is a great way to recognize the achievement of committed young people and also to encourage and support young people on the fringes to engage more deeply in parish life and as a disciple of Jesus. <http://www.bcys.co.uk>

FIVE PRECEPTS OF THE CHURCH *What are they*? (1) You shall attend Mass on Sunday and holy days of obligation and abstain from work or activities that offend against the character of the day. (2) You shall receive the sacrament of Penance at least once a year. (3) You shall receive the Eucharist at least during the Easter season. (4) You shall observe the prescribed seasons of fasting and days of abstinence (Ash Wednesday and Good Friday). (5) You shall contribute to the material support of the Church. ***What is the purpose of the precepts of the Church, and how binding are they?*** The "Five Precepts of the Church" with their minimum requirements are supposed to remind us that one cannot be a Christian without making a moral effort, without participating personally in the sacramental life of the Church, and without union with her in solidarity. They are obligatory for every Catholic Christian. (YOUCAT questions 345-346).

MISERICORDIAE VULTUS THE FACE OF MERCY From the beginning of his Pontificate, Pope Francis has made it his priority to carry God's mercy to the whole world. WHAT ARE CREEDS? Creeds are brief formulas of faith that make it possible for all believers to make a common profession. Brief formulas of this kind can be found already in the letters of St. Paul. The early Christian Apostles' Creed has a special dignity, because it is thought to be a summary of the faith of the apostles. The Nicene Creed is highly esteemed because it resulted from the great councils of the Church when Christendom was still undivided (Nicaea, 325; Constantinople, 381) and is to this day the common basis for the Christian in the East and the West. (YOUCAT question 26).

How did the creeds come about? The creeds go back to Jesus, who commanded his disciples to baptize. In doing so, they were to require of the people seeking Baptism the profession of a definite faith, namely, faith in the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit (Trinity). The original cell from which all later creeds grew is the profession of faith in Jesus the Lord and in his missionary mandate. He told his apostles, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Mt 28:19). All the creeds of the Church are elaborations of the faith in this Triune God. Each of them begins with a profession of faith in the Father, the Creator and preserver of the world, then refers to the Son, through whom the world and we ourselves have found redemption, and concludes with a profession of faith in the Holy Spirit, who is the presence of God in the Church and in the world.
